SOLDIERS BEST IN UNMARKED GRAVES

Wood Lake Battle Monument Commission Unable to Locate Tombs of Fallen.

MINNEAPOLIS, July 27.—Thorough search for four graves of soldiers killed in the battle of Wood Lake in Yellow Medicine county, Sept. 23, 1862, has failed to locate the spot and the state's monument on the battlefield will be erected without definite location of the graves. The contract for the monument, which is to be a tall granite shaft, has been let and the monument will be unveiled Sept. 23, on the forty-seventh anniversary of the battle.

The battle of Wood Lake was the decisive battle in General Sibler's second campaign against the Sioux Indians. It resulted in the capture of the Indians of the tribe, whom afterward hanged at Mankato in the rescue of hundreds of white women and children who had been made prisoners by the Sioux.

The sixth, seventh and ninth Minnesota regiments participated in the battle. After the engagement the bodies of four of the soldiers killed were buried on the battlefield. HOW BREWING IN SOCIALIST BANKS

Prominent Members of Party at Milwaukee Disagree Regarding Traction Franchises.

MILWAUKEE, July 27.—The Journal this afternoon says that Socialist harmony is in danger in Milwaukee and that the trouble is brewing over traction franchises. Some of the prominent members of the party have taken Alderman Victor Berger, who is looked upon as one of the leaders of the party to task for his stand on a question of new franchises for cross-town lines.

Mr. Berger is quoted as saying to John J. Beggs, president and general manager of the Milwaukee Electric Railway company that unless Mr. Beggs grants concessions giving the people greater privileges than those contained in the 1906 franchise, he will not get franchises from this administration. To this Mr. Beggs answered:

"Then I don't want any. There positively will not be any additional concessions to street car companies that they now have."

One of the cabinet members, criticizing Mr. Berger said that the latter had not been in the city three weeks; at his summer home out of the city two weeks and that he was now preparing to leave for Copenhagen.
