It is to the former that the speculator should carefully confine his attention, taking an in-terest in parent enterprises only. It is generally understood that there are two district formations on the West Coast of Africaquartz and banket. Of the former class of property the Ashanti Goldfields Corporation, owning 100 square miles in Bekwai and Adansi, is believed to have the beat, and although its shares are quoted at 25, the price is not so enormous for an issued capital of £130,000, having regard to the area possessed. Other mines of this character not absolutely proved but possessing undobuted merit, and under sound control are the Bibiani, Gold Coast and Ashanti Explorers, Adansi, Claude's Ashanti, and the Obuassi. THE PRED LIBRARY The following is the report of the Free Library Committee for the post year ;-

The institution continues to afford every satisfaction as to its working and progress. and its beneficial effects, as an educational factor, are daily more and more appreciated by the citizens. During the year just ended there has been a further increase in the number of horrowers of books for perusal at home. Nevertheless, the average daily issue for the year has been 84, while in the previous year it was 88. There are upwards of 1,600 borrowers availing themselves of the advantages of the lending-out branch of the library. As regards visitors to the reading rooms, there has been a slight falling off. This possibly may be accounted for by the circumstances that most of the works of fiction now in the collection having been already perused by some readers, they abstain from seeking other

works of a more solid character. As it is of

who come to read. It is but just to say that the visitors appreciate the efforts of the committee, for the utmost decorum and silence are invariably observed. If the accommodation could be improved in point of extent, here is every reason to believe that the number of those who might make use of the Free Library would be much greater than it is now. The present building, as has been frequently stated by your committee, though the best that could be obtained at the time, has proved now wholly unsuited to the purcommittee once more beg to resterate their strong recommendation that a suitable home shall be procured by the Borough Council to provide accommodation for a Public Free Library, a museum and a Lecture Hall.
