THE DAKOTA TRAGEDY.

The duty devolves upon us this week to give the public the particulars so for as they are known of the recent tragedy at Miller, Dakota, which resulted in the death of Daniel Wolfe and Wm. H. Macomber. It them, are as follows: Friday morning, the 11th inst., Daniel Wolfe and Wm. H. Macomber left Miller together in a buggy intending to drive to Huron a town some distance east of there. They were in good spirits, laughing and joking when they perhaps about two o'clock, though some accounts fix the time a little earlier, the dead body of Mr. Wolfe was discovered on the prairie several miles from Wessington, a town lying about twelve miles from Miller. The immédiate cause of the discovery was a fire which started near where the body was found. Men who went to extinguish the fire found Mr. Wolfe lying dead with a bullet wound in his head. Macomber arrived at Wessington in time for dinner. He took dinner there and then in company with a man named Rank, who had left Miller about the same time that Mr. Wolfe and Macomber did and who rode to Wessington on the little town of St. Lawrence for a time. Rank's horse was led behind the buggy. They arrived in Miller about five o'clock in the evening. Macomber explained that Mr. false pretenses. At the livery barn where he had hired the rie He heard this and although at this time suspicion had not been directed towards him and he could have left town without question or hindrance, he made no effort to leave but remained for several hours until he was arrested upon suspicion of having committed the crime of murder He remained down town for some time. went to the train and purchased a newsparer and finally returned to the residence of F M Mead where he had a room lt was observed that he was restless and nervous

and he sent a boy down town to purchase laudanum, claiming he had a toothache By this time suspicion had been aroused that he might have been concerned in the murder, if it was murder, which had resulted in the death of Mr. Wolfe. He was placed under surveillance, but nothing was said to him to indicate that he was suspected. The boy was intercepted and the laudannm was not furnished, the druggist sending a substitute instead. Another effort to procure laudanum also failed. About eight o'clock in the evening the sheriff of the county arrived and went Mr. Mead's house to make the arrest. When confronted with the officer Will appeared perfectly cool He told the sheriff he could not arrest him without papers. To this the officer explained that he did not need a warrant to hold him and in order to prove that he was an officer he produced his commission. Will took the paper and read or appeared to read it carefully. He then called Mr. Mead into the room and asked if

that he was. The sheriff took a pair of handcuffs from his pocket when Will said most as quick as lightning drew a revolver from his coat pocket and placing it to the side of his head fired and fell, being caught by the officer before he reached the floor. He died instantly. These are the facts. The missing buffalo robe was afterwards found in the railroad office having been

It was an event which will be long re shipped to parties at Cedar Rapids. It is said there was blood upon it. While the conclusion is inevitable that Will Macomber knew that Wolfe was dead and was aware of the circumstances under which he died it does not necessarily follow that he deliberately murdered him. The men were friends and there was certainly nothing in their relations which would warrant the conclusion that a quarhad arisen between them. When they left Miller in the morning they were both in good spirits and at that time nothing had occurred to base any theory upon that the killing was an act of revenge. It has been suggested, and perhaps the theory most generally adopted is, that robbery was the motive. But the fact that no money of any account was found upon Macomber's body, and the further fact that if such was the motive there were plenty of opportunities which involved less risk than the method adopted throws doubt upon this idea. Another theory which finds many advocates, and they are by no means confined to the immediate friends of the unfortunate young man whose life has paid the penalty of whatever error he committed, is that the shooting of Wolfe was accidental. Such things have frequently occurred in the past. Numerous accidents in which weapons have been accidentally discharged resulting in the loss of life can be recalled by every body. Now supposing that while they were riding along Macomber's revolver was accidentally discharged and Mr. Wolfe received a fatal wound. Of course the best course to pursue would have been to have taken him at once to the nearest town and explained what had occurred. But in such an event suspicion would certainly attach in some degree to the man who was with him at the time. Appalled by the trugedy who can say but what the young man, who was as yet but little more than a boy, had Adolar, and lots of useful things.

Everybody must have their own opinion of the case but for our part we shall never believe that when the two men drove away from Miller on Friday morning and Will laughingly bade his friends goodbye that he was meditating the crime at that time. either before or after the event seem to warrant the conclusion. Why should he return to Miller when he had a good team and could have put many miles between himself and pursuit? Why should he go about it so openly if he contemplated a deed like this? But as we said at first the mystery is a deep one and there is little prospect that it will ever be revealed. For our part we prefer to believe that the grosser elements of crime are not in the case. We feel certain that the relatives and friends ments of crime are not in the case. There is much that is mysterious about the affair and in all probability the circumstances will never be fully knnwn. Both those who could have related them are dead and surmise must supply many links that are missing and which would be required to make the story complete. Briefly the facts, so far as we have been able to ascertain them, are as follows: Friday morning, the
