**This Man's Blood**  
**LOPEZ ADDS TO HIS VICTIMS**  
 Kills Two Deputies in Underground Passages of Mine at Bingham, Utah.

Salt Lake City, Utah, Nov. 29.—Ralph Lopez, the Mexican handit who killed four men last week, shot and probably killed two deputy sheriffs today in a battle in the underground workings of the Utah open mine near Bingham. The men shot are believed to be deputies Hilley and Mendrich. They were left in the mine by their comrades, together with two Austrians who were injured, but were cut off from escape. Immediately after the shooting a posse of five was organized from the mine and fight it out with the desperado. The underground fight was the result of several deputies penetrating the mine and striking Lopez. Lopez shot a deputy sheriff with the intention of striking Lopez out. As soon as a match was struck Lopez opened fire. On November 21 Lopez killed the deputy sheriff Hilley and Mendrich. He shot from the depths of his strong hold tonight.

**COMPANIES IN AGREEMENT**  
 Dallas Light Company Would Have Stone and Webster Supply Down Town Customers.

Dallas, Nov. 29.—Representing the Dallas Ice Plant, Light and Power company, General M. C. Crane appeared before the city commissioners this afternoon and asked permission to enter into a contract with Stone & Webster for the supplying of light and power to downtown customers of the city. General Crane told the board that such a contract was necessary owing to the recent order compelling the laying of underground wiring in the business section. He said that the Dallas Ice Plant, Light and Power company would not be financially able to stand the expense of such an improvement. The franchise ordinance which gives the Dallas Electric Light and Power company permission to operate in Dallas was probably never amended in order to make the same. Attorney Charles O'Donnell states that the city commissioners have such an amendment. General Crane said that it was not the purpose of his company to raise their rates.

**WOULD CHANGE ELECTION LAW**  
 Hutton W. Summers Suggests Plan for Traveling Men to Vote Anywhere in the State.  
 Dallas, Nov. 29.—Hutton W. Summers, congressman-at-large from Texas, left today for Washington, where he goes to assume his duties as one of the national lawmakers. Mr. Summers has been in Texas for some time and before leaving for the national capitol he announced that he hoped to be back in Dallas again in time to eat Christmas dinner here. Before leaving, Mr. Summers also offered a suggestion in regard to what he believes would be a valuable change in the election laws of Texas. He believes that traveling men should be given authority to vote for any district official in the event they are away from their homes on election day at some point within their district and for all state officials no matter in what part of the state they may be on election day.

**MUST NOTIFY HIS EMPLOYEES**  
 Industrial Accident Board Calls Attention of Employers to the Law.  
 Austin, Nov. 29.—The industrial accident board especially calls the attention of employers to the law which became, or desires to become, a subscriber to the Employers' Liability Act. The industrial accident board has issued a circular to the effect that every employer who is a subscriber to the Employers' Liability Act should notify his employees of the provisions of the act as soon as he secures a policy of insurance that he has provided for payment of compensation for injuries with the company or association named in the policy. Failure to give such notice, it is believed, will give the board something to say about the right to elect whether he will claim compensation under the act or bring a suit as hereafter.

**Woman Released on Bond.**  
 Dallas, Nov. 29.—Overruling her motion for a new trial, Mrs. Minnie McClary, pretty white woman, was released from custody this morning by Judge Seay of the criminal district court on a \$1,000 bond. The woman was convicted several days ago on a charge of arson and punishment fixed at five years in the state penitentiary. Judge Seay declared he found no reversible error in the case and for that reason was overruling. He expressed the hope that something would be done for the defendant would occur.
