

HE WANTS THAT OFFICE

Judge Stackpole Would Like to Handle the County Funds.

VOTES ARE NOT A FACTOR

D. F. Hallahan, Who Was Elected to the Office Recently, Must Defend His Rights in the Law Courts.

The papers in the contest of the election of D. F. Hallahan to the office of county treasurer were filed yesterday upon the defendant. The case is set for hearing on Saturday before Judge Brantly. Mr. Hallahan has secured the services of Col. T. O'Leary of this city and E. B. Smith of Helena has been sent for, but he is now in Virginia City and it is not known if it will be possible for him to be present. The complaint, which is signed by E. S. Stackpole, as plaintiff and contestant, recites that he is a resident and an elector in Deer Lodge county. That an election for county treasurer for a term of two years, that D. F. Hallahan appeared upon the tickets that were voted at that election as a candidate for the office of treasurer. That the ballots cast and voted for said D. F. Hallahan as well as those cast for other persons were counted by the judges of said election, that said votes have been canvassed by the county commissioners who declared D. F. Hallahan duly elected county treasurer. The complaint asserts that D. F. Hallahan was not elected county treasurer and is not entitled to hold said office by virtue of said election.

That said D. F. Hallahan was not nominated for treasurer in the manner required by law for the reason that the pretended nomination was not made by any organized assembly or convention of delegates, representing any party or principle or by any convention called for the purpose of making nominations to public office.

That the certificate of nomination which was forwarded to the county clerk was not in accordance with the requirements of the statute in this, that it did not state the business address, nor his business address, and did not state any party or principle which he represented, nor the office for which he was nominated. The said certificate is the only one of any kind or nature or for any office for said Hallahan previous to the election. The certificate was filed with the clerk Oct. 3, 1894, and thereupon the clerk in pursuance of said alleged nomination placed the name of D. F. Hallahan upon the ticket to be voted at said election.

That previous to said election and previous to the nomination of Hallahan the populist convention for Deer Lodge county was held June 23, for the purpose of nominating candidates to be voted for at this election, and the said convention did then and there nominate for treasurer one E. Whitmire.

That as said Stackpole is informed and believes, said Whitmire declined that nomination and a certificate of his nomination thereto was not filed, nor was his resignation in writing or otherwise filed with the clerk. The plaintiff believes that the nomination of Hallahan was made for the purpose of filling the vacancy on the people's party ticket for said office caused by the said declination of Whitmire, and for no other purpose. The certificate of nomination of Hallahan did not set forth the cause of such vacancy or that any such vacancy existed.

That the convention of the people's party did not delegate to any committee the power to fill any vacancy in the nominations made by it.

That the said certificate was not made or signed by 10 electors residing within this county.

The name of Hallahan was not written on any ticket voted or cast at said election.

The nomination of E. S. Stackpole, the republican candidate and J. B. McManister, the democratic candidate is then alleged to be made in violation and against the law.

It is then stated that Hallahan received 1,794 votes for said office; Stackpole 1,554 legal votes; and the said McManister 1,111 votes.

That the plaintiff Stackpole is qualified to hold the office of treasurer and that Hallahan not being duly nominated, he, said Stackpole, was duly elected and is entitled to said office.

An alleged copy of the certificate of nomination in question is marked exhibit A and filed with the complaint and is as follows:

DEER LODGE, Mont., Oct. 3, 1894.

At a regular meeting of the County Central committee of the people's party of Deer Lodge county, held at Anaconda, Montana, Sept. 5, 1894, the following nominations were made: For county treasurer, D. F. Hallahan of Anaconda, Montana, whose name is hereby set on the ticket for said office; for county surveyor, J. P. Mitchell of Deer Lodge, Montana, surveyor and assessor; Chairman, Dr. E. B. Mitchell, physician, Deer Lodge, Montana; E. B. Bedford, bookkeeper, Anaconda, Montana; A. H. Mitchell, E. B. Bedford, Secretary.
